
Woodland Caribou









What It Looks Like



The woodland caribou are interesting looking animal. They have a small white tail, wide muzzle, white belly and white rump. Their coat is thin and brown in the summer and turns thick and gray in the winter. The underside of the hoof is hallow which is used for digging. Because of their wide hoofs it allows them to travel through snow. They are about 4.5 feet tall and have larger antlers than females (which are also known as cows).

The Woodland Caribou usually live in a old-growth forest. Surprisingly they like the cold and don't migrate during winter. They also sometimes live near the mountains. But usually they just make their homes where their is lichen.
